Vehicles travelling through the village of Chilmark

to the EHD site EHD have said that they are doing all they can to prevent vehicles from travelling through the village of Chilmark on their way to and from the commercial site. However in the event that a van is seen in the village they would appreciate help from residents by noting the vehicle registration number and the name of the supplier from the side of the van. Could you please pass these details, plus where and when the siting took place, to a member of the Parish Council or the Clerk by email: jenny.macdougall@ outlook.com or to EHD direct on 01722 273128. We hope that together we can reduce the impact on the village.

Highways Maintenance

£1m has been set aside by Wilts Council to reintroduce the Parish Steward Scheme that the Parish Council will be able to access in due course. It is expected that one Parish Steward will be made available to be shared by several parishes. A timetable of visits will be drawn up by Wiltshire Council and the Parish Council will prioritise the tasks which need to be completed during the visit. More information will follow as the scheme start-date draws near. There used to be a similar scheme and the Parish Steward or Highways Engineer was called the Parish Lengths man. This system worked well. He was often seen beside the road with a brush and spade clearing gullies, drains and signposts. The implements will no doubt be more high tech now and less time allowed for the job. However all statutory and safety issues associated with roads, such as potholes, will need to be reported on the "My Wiltshire" App. Please be aware that residents as well as Parish Councillors can use this system to make a report.

Low flying helicopters

A complaint has been received about the noise from apache helicopters exercising over the village and this has been registered with the MOD.

The Defibrillator and the Response Team

Some 12 Chilmark residents took advantage of the Free First Aid Training & Defibrillator familiarisation sessions organized by the South West Wilts Area Board during May. The St John Amublance training covered essential resuscitation techniques for adults and children. A date will now be set for the 'trainees' to meet up in the Reading Room to ensure they are all familiar with the Chilmark defibrillator. For more information please contact



Focus Point

In the week before Pentecost Sunday, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York invited churches to share in praying the Lord's Prayer daily with a special intention for the renewal of faith. Many will already pray the Lord's Prayer regularly, but the invitation to focus on the words in this way started me thinking about the prayer afresh. It is almost certainly the most wellknown prayer in the church and beyond. Its words somehow seem to be embedded in our psyche and phrases, if not the whole prayer are known and used by those who might be surprised where they come from. Daily bread springs to mind, for example.

Some will have me speak about how the words of the

Lord's Prayer unites us back through the centuries with those first disciples who asked Jesus to teach them to pray and across the world now with all those who pray that prayer in so many different languages, whatever their denomination or way of worship. It is so well-known and yet so powerful. To quote the Archbishops: It is impossible to overstate the lifetransforming power of the Lord's Prayer. It is a prayer that is reassuring enough to be on the lips of the dying and yet dangerous enough to be banned in cinemas. It is famous enough to be spoken each day by billions in hundreds of languages and yet intimate enough to draw us ever closer into friendship with Jesus Christ. It is simple enough to be memorised by small children and yet profound enough to sustain a whole lifetime of prayer. When we pray it with sincerity and with joy, there is no imagining the new ways in which God can use us to his glory.

More broadly, my reflections led me on to other ways in which we feel a sense of fellowship and unity with others. In our oh-so divided world, surely we need to find what unites us instead of what separates us. Within a community, or a church, a sense of shared history can unite. As I prepare to move to a new benefice, I know that I will be going into a place where I have no background and very little understanding, as yet, of the history of the place. Although I look forward to becoming part of the story there I have, perhaps, become more conscious of how not having that shared story can set someone apart - perhaps a useful thought for us as we meet new people in our community. Having a shared story can unite us, but it can also exclude those who do not share that story. How do we include them in our story; how do we help them to feel they belong? May we always be those who seek what unites us and what can draw us closer together, rather than those who hold tightly to that which can divide us. **Rev. Jane**





Hindon Surgery News

Registrations: since we came to Hindon in 2003, our list size has increased by 10% with an increase of 47% in those aged 65 and over. Older people need more medical care so this increase has caused disproportionately more work. We do a lot more in the practice without the need of hospital help, and before referring to hospital we do all the tests and management so that the hospital only has to do what only a hospital can do. We contact patients soon after hospital discharge (one reason for the latest expansion in our practice nursing team) and manage problems to a plan set by the hospital. These changes mean we do a lot more work and have a larger team working over double the hours.

This is all good enjoyable medicine and we intend to continue doing this and everything else (like same day access and continuity of care) that we are doing and that our patients like.


However, we can only do this for patients who live within our practice area. In the past we had a few patients who moved away, but not that far, who wanted to stay with us and we could accommodate this. But in recent months we have registered almost 90 new patients (about 4% of the total list) with many from outside our area. This uncontrolled increase is risking the quality of care we provide.

Practice areas are set for a number of reasons – not just to be able to avoid being swamped by demand but because all our support services are also local. Patients who live a long way away often do not see us as they should – they don't come for review appointments and present later when unwell. So having a GP far from home can be bad for your health, however good you feel they are when you eventually see them.

We are now unable to accept any new patients who live outside our practice area (visit www. hindonsurgery.co.uk for details) and existing patients who move away will have to register with their local GP. Anyone living within the practice area who wants to be looked after by us can still register. Patients who have previously moved outside the practice area who are already on our list may continue to be registered with us.
