

A History please?

Sheep, then clothes, and subsequently cheeses and horses were traded until the fair ceased in 1874. Four years later the Annual Flower Show was launched, involving the church and school as well other residents. AGM the following week, are your chance to participate in local democracy.



Chilmark Cricket Club

The Club opened up their 2016 campaign with the traditional 'pre-season' game away at Horningsham on Sunday 17th April.

The ground, suffering from recent rains, was so swampy in places that the likelihood of Yoda appearing and offering to take on square leg umpiring duties was ever present. None the less, players on both sides were keen to shake off the winter rust and get leather on willow.

Winning the toss, captain Pete Stevens sent Horningsham in to bat, and it looked to be a good move as the openers were very cautious in the face of some tight and spritely bowling from a lean and fit Darren Lee, whilst at the other end young Jack Stearman was landing them on a good length and restricting the batsmen from obtaining easy runs.

Lee provided the first break through, inciting a thick edge which was well taken behind the stumps by 'keeper Jason Stearman. Archie Small then came into the attack and immediately tempted the batsman into a lofted shot that was comfortably taken by CCC chairman Carl Jacobs at mid-on. There followed a period of tight bowling, before Brand King induced a false stroke from Horningsham's number three, the catch spoonfed to a hungry Ben Fowles fielding close on the off side.

Optimism at the prospect of an easy day in the field was soon extinguished, however, as the next pair of bats put on 72 runs at an ever-increasing rate. Ricky Corbin was on the receiving end of some lusty batting, his four overs going for 45 runs. There was the consolation, however, of a wicket, caught in the outfield by King. *contd...*

The pair combined again for the day's comedy moment when King, chasing the possibility of another outfield catch, instead tripped over some equipment stationed a few yards outside the playing area, as the ball sailed over his head for another six. It was agreed that King made the incident look graceful and athletic.

As the Horningsham bats looked for quick runs towards the end of the innings, all bowlers saw their figures suffer, though Ben Fowles managed to bag a couple of streaky wickets in the mix. All in all it was a good performance by CCC. Most catches were taken and the bowling was generally tight.

After a generous spread of sandwiches for tea, Chilmark set about chasing the 175 needed for victory. Openers King and Fowles got off to a watchful start, before the former demonstrated that he couldn't follow his own mid-wicket advice and fell, trying to speed things along. Jack Stearman joined Fowles at the crease and the two put on a steady 33 run partnership before the junior member lost his wicket for a well made 13. Fowles, by this time, was batting through back pain which was restricting his usual free-flowing stroke play and gazelle-like running between wickets.

As the wickets fell and with time of the essence, Fowles threw the bat and was finally put out of his misery for a bravely compiled 35. DJ Gent (24 not out) and Captain Stevens (20) scored briskly in the final few overs, however the total was always slightly out of reach and the team from Chilmark exhausted their allotment of overs, 35 runs short of the mark. The game was played in good spirits which continued is the Bath Arms of the game always always and the spirits which continued

Following the opening of the school's new library by former pupil Mike Rawlins, we asked him for his memories of Chilmark School during the 1940s.

What was the school like when you were here? We only had two teachers, Mrs Simons who taught the infants and Mrs Jones who took the rest of the school. You could take your 11+ test and if you passed you could go to Grammar school. If you didn't pass you had to stay in the school until you were 14! I went to grammar but my older brother Godfrey did not.

When I moved to Ridge and started at Chilmark School I was seven; Godfrey was the naughty one and would often get the cane. One day, when he was bigger, he caught the stick from Mrs Jones and broke it, putting it into the fire! Mrs Jones was so cross that the Vicar had to go and talk to our parents.

What was your worst lesson?

Dancing with the girls; it was called country dancing and we boys hated it. Mrs Jones was Welsh and taught singing as well; we sang a lot of Welsh songs. I did not like singing!

Were you ever in trouble?

Yes - I had bad handwriting but my brother was the naughty one.

Did you have after school clubs?

There were no clubs, We would leave school as quickly as possible. Sometimes Mrs Jones would keep us in after school for being bad. I would run away and hide behind the hedge until she gave up calling.



Did you have a school uniform?

There was no school uniform; most of us were farming families and would wear our own clothes. I lived at Ridge and would walk one-and-a-half miles with my brothers to school; even my youngest brother walked and he was five! We were poor, so when our shoes had holes in them we would put cardboard in them to keep the stones out.

Did you have school dinners?

There were no hot dinners; we brought sandwiches. The local children would all go home for lunch and we were allowed to play out in the village. We would sometimes climb on the roof of the garage next to the school. There were no teachers on duty to watch us. One day the delivery man was taking the first bananas seen after the war to the village shop and we all asked him to give use one; he did. That was my first ever banana. I got into trouble for throwing the skins onto the school roof!

Did you remember the War?

Not really, I remember being woken up by sirens, we would all hide under the table.

What do you like about our school now?

I would have loved a library like the one you have. I didn't read many books but a library would have helped me to start reading sooner. **Calling all Gardeners** - Perennials Wanted for the Church Fete Plant Stall in June!

Then and Now

A peek back in time to a 'village questionnaire' of 1978 reveals some fascinating insights into how life in Chilmark has, and in some cases hasn't, changed in the past 38 years.

An impressive 80% of the 169 questionnaires delivered to homes in the village were completed, revealing the following information:

- Some 47% of households had lived in Chilmark for less than 5 years and only 18% for more than 30 years
- There were 108 people under the age of 20 as opposed to just 28 people over 70
- There was virtually no unemployment and 56 people described themselves as retired
- 51 people worked in Chilmark itself and 18 were employed at RAF Chilmark. Some 22 people worked 'on the land'.
- An impressive 29 per cent of villagers either walked or cycled to work and 23 children used the School Bus service
- 38 households had no telephone
- 30 Chilmark children were currently attending the village primary school
- 69 people owned their home, 39 people rented and 25 were 'service' tenants
- Nearly 50 people felt there was a need for more housing, though 61 people disagreed
- Preservation of Chilmark's rural character was considered the most important requirement, followed by retention of the school and the church

Clearly much has changed since 1978, not least the number of locally-schooled children living in the village. And while RAF Chilmark is no longer an employer, it's good to know that the former RAF HQ building has taken on a new lease of life with Team Rubicon (see page 20). Maybe it's time for another survey?

Focus

If like me you have an electronic diary you will notice that the month of May is book-ended by the two Bank Holidays: May Day and the oddly named Spring Bank Holiday or even more oddly, as I have seen, elsewhere, Spring Holiday (do we need a holiday from Spring?). For those easily confused - go to the last paragraph (no, please don't!).

For me by the end of May we are not really any longer in Spring anyway, for my garden is looking forward to

summer, and in addition it is a holiday more tightly linked, in many families, with school 'half-term' or in this age of the six-term school year, the end of term 5. In the days before banks were seen to be so important that they needed a holiday of their own, the "Spring Holiday" actually marks a much older holiday with Christian religious origins. It is also one of the days which gives us the phrase a "Red Letter day" because the ecclesiastical calendars, and specifically the Book of Common Prayer, marked those days which were important Saint's days in red, and celebrated by the wearing of red vestments while the hangings in the churches were red too. Paradoxically it is also a White day, as in many older communities it is still called the Whit Weekend or Whitsun bank holiday - confused yet? There's more! Celebrated this year on May 15, Whitsun, said to have been a day when the newly baptised wore white robes to church - hence the name - is the feast of Pentecost which comes from the Greek word for the 50th day after Easter and is in fact the second greatest festival of the Christian church. This is the day when we celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles and which is unofficially celebrated as the birthday of the Church. For those of you who like quirky symbols, some of the medieval paintings depicting the scene made the disciples, with a flame of fire over their heads, look like birthday candles! But I digress!

Finally, I must add, the Sunday that we in the Western church celebrate as Pentecost or Whitsunday, is in the Eastern church celebrated as Holy Trinity, with Monday as the Feast of the Holy Spirit on which, once more we are allowed to kneel after having been forbidden to do so throughout the Easter season!

So May could be renamed Holiday month as it is packed full of a rich array of them across the world from ones celebrating Horses (Spain), Cats (Belgium, yes, it's true), Buns (Cheung Chau, Hong Kong), Cheese rolling (Gloucestershire), rockets, roses, candles and Film (Cannes) and, lest we forget - anyone for Morris dancing and the Maypole in Ansty?

Have a blessed May, whatever you celebrate. **Mark Hayter**

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
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
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The Village Show

The Romans of South Wiltshire

Last month (April) further evidence emerged that there was a large Roman presence in this area with news of the discovery of an 'elaborate' Roman villa, erroneously reported by the media as being near Tisbury. Some 10 miles further west along the Roman road which inter twines with Grim's ditch at the uppermost north boundary of Chilmark Parish, and is thought to be the ancient route linking Winchester and Old Sarum to the Mendips, lies the 'Deverills'. The villa was discovered in the grounds of the Brixton Deverill home of Irish born rug designer and maker Luke Irwin when he was laying electrical cables in his garden. His builders uncovered an untouched mosaic, and further excavations revealed a Roman villa described as 'extraordinaily-well preserved' and which is thought be one of the largest of its kind in the country.

Dr David Roberts, archaeologist for Historic England, said:" This site has not been touched since its collapse 1400 years ago and, as such, is of enormous importance. Without question, this

is a hugely valuable site in terms of research, with incredible potential. The discovery is unparalleled in recent years. Overall, the excellent preservation, large scale and complexity of this site present a unique opportunity to understand Roman and post-Roman Britain."

For now, insufficient funds are available to conduct a full excavation of the site. However, initial excavations revealed a range of 'high status' Roman artefacts together with oyster shells indicating a rich lifestyle and the ability of the Romans to use their elaborate road system to move goods around with ease. Similar artefacts were found when constructing Fonthill House just west of Ridge. Roman coins have been found near Chilmark Quarry and there is evidence that Chilmark Stone was used at the site of the Roman Villa in Rockbourne. The Teffont Archaeological Project, which started on the Parish of Chilmark's eastern boundary in 2008, has produced further evidence of an established Roman presence in the area. Watch out when you are digging: you never know what you might find!

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Hindon Surgery News

Cancer Survival Rates

Cancer survival is measured in terms of the number of people who have not died from the cancer five years after diagnosis. Sweden does best in Europe with 64.7%. In England, the survival rate is 50.2%.

At Hindon we have one of the highest cancer rates in Wiltshire but our patients also survive longer after diagnosis - five year survival for all cancers is 78.5%. This varies between cancers as some are more aggressive or difficult to treat or there are no screening tests or early symptoms.

In line with national statistics, lung cancer, for example has a relatively poor survival rate (Hindon 14.3%), but we have not had that many patients with this cancer as we have low rates of smokers (about 14% compared to 21% nationally).

We feel a survival rate that's better than the UK mean is due to a combination of factors:

- We have made cancer care and early diagnosis a priority for a number of years
- We strive to make sure our patients are very aware of the symptoms and signs of possible early cancer and what can increase the risk of cancer - smoking and being overweight being easily the most important. And we encourage you to consult us quickly.
- We also encourage all our patients to participate in the national cancer screening programmes – cervix (smears), breast (mammography), bowel
 and to see us if worried about any symptoms.
- We promote healthy living to reduce the risks of cancer (a healthy lifestyle also reduces risks of other common serious diseases like diabetes, heart attacks, strokes) and have information at the surgery, on our website or face-to-face with the practice nurse.

Finding a cancer early is worth doing – it is easier to treat, the outcomes are much better and you will be likely to live much longer free of problems. Cancer treatments have improved but it is still far better to reduce the risk in the first place and find a problem early.



Chilmark chosen as UK home for disaster relief charity

A disaster relief charity set up in the wake of last year's devastating Nepal earthquake has moved into the former RAF Chilmark's HQ. Team Rubicon UK combines the skills of volunteer military veterans and first responders to deploy emergency response teams in the wake of disasters. Since its launch, teams have responded to the Nepal earthquake as well as flooding in the UK in Keswick and Tadcaster. It has also taken part in rebuilding projects in the Philippines and Nepal.

The former RAF Headquarters on the Chilmark Estate was chosen as their new home after a lengthy search. CEO John Leach said: "We wanted a venue where we could welcome our volunteers, provide training and run operations. We have a challenge on our hands to furnish the building to make it as welcoming and comfortable as possible for our volunteers. A core staff of nine will be based at the site with a view to engaging local volunteers to support the charity's work on a regular basis. Regular residential training courses for volunteer veterans will take place during the week and weekends.
