

Many hands made light work at Chilmark's Playground

The playground by the playing field near Claybush has got a smart new safety surface thanks to support from villagers and local funding organisations. The surface needs regular renewal but as the playground is not publicly funded, the committee that runs it has to fund it themselves. The total cost of the new bark surface was £1223. We applied to Wiltshire Council for a Community Area Grant and were awarded £532 on the condition that we matched the funding ourselves, and the Parish Council also made a contribution towards the project. With Parish Council agreement we were able to go ahead and order the wood chip and this arrived on the first Friday in October. Thanks to Giles with his materials handler, and a number of



committee members with friends and family wielding rakes and shovels, the bark was distributed over the play area by lunchtime on the Saturday. Most grateful thanks are due to all the workers on the morning, Henry and Elizabeth Pelham, the Community Area Grant Committee and the Parish Council, all of whom played their part in enabling this project to be completed successfully. Ridge in the early 1900s

Raymond Jack has provided us with extracts from a diary kept by an un-named member of the Harris family who lived and farmed in or near Ridge during the first part of the last century. The family moved to Knap Farm, Ridge, in September 1907, as tenants. They included two sisters, Florence, 'Flo', and Elsie. The sisters later took on the tenancy from their father, and were still farming the land until after the last war. They then moved to the house where Raymond now lives - the only house in the village not then owned by the Morrison family. The sisters were great supporters of Ridge Chapel, and a plague commemorates them in the porch. They feature in the diary together with Father or Dad, and Mother so the writer is probably a sibling. While much of the contents suggest the writer was a hard-labouring man, there are also references to

doing washing, stockings and a corset indicating that it was a woman. The author's identity remains a mystery throughout the diary which, though intended for 1897, was used to make a haphazard record of life around Ridge from 1901 to the early 1920s.



The first extract is from the autumn of 1906, a year before the family moved into Knap Farm. It isn't clear where in the neighbourhood they were living at that time.

'Started the bean cutting the 4th September. Flo, Elsie and I went to Salisbury the 30th October. Mother and Kit went to Salisbury the next week. Thrashed our corn the 19th November. (This would probably have meant a travelling thrashing machine coming to their rick yard). Had about 6 sacks of beans, about 15 sacks of barley, about 9 sacks of oats and 2 and ¾ of wheat. Dad bought a mangel cutter the 31st October for 19/6 (just under £1; mangels or mangel wurzels: a beet used to feed animals through the winter). Cut the wagnash hedge and sewed the wheat the middle of December.'

John Morrison, later the first Lord Margadale, was born on 16 December 1906. As the Harris family did not move to Knap Farm until 1907 they were not among the 25 'inhabitants of Ridge' who 'desire[d] to convey to Mr Hugh and Lady Mary Morrison our hearty congratulations on the birth of a son and heir and sincerely trust that John Granville Morrison may be spared to live a long and prosperous life and that he like the child Samuel may increase in favour with God and man.' A copy of this appears on a blank page near the front of the diary.

Further extracts to follow in forthcoming issues of The Village Voice. Meanwhile, we would love to hear from any of our Readers who might be able to explain what a 'wagnash' hedge is!

Peter Alistair Pettigrew

3rd February 1940 - 28th September 2015

Born in Karachi, India in 1940, Peter was educated at Bedford College before joining the Duke of Wellington's regiment in 1960. It was here that Peter developed into an accomplished all-round sportsman, playing rugby for the Army, boxing for his regiment, cricket, gymnastics and golf (Halford Hewitt). Later in life he even tried his hand at skiing, but with less success – his style was described as fast but untidy.

His Army postings included British Honduras, Germany, for the UN in Cyprus, and Hong Kong. Peter left the Army in 1970, but not before marrying his beloved Anne in 1965 and fathering two children of whom he was very proud.

He stayed on in Hong Kong for 30 years, working for ICL and, later, becoming more entrepreneurial. He eventually came into my life in April 2001 when he and Anne settled in Chilmark. We hit it off right from the start and it wasn't long before he was elected onto the committee of Chilmark Cricket Club, where for 14 years we benefited from his wisdom, his experience, his work ethic and his wonderful sense of humour. That empty seat at our meetings will be very hard to fill, but as Peter would say - "there's no such thing as 'can't'".

As Peter's active sports participation lessened with age, he became a very knowledgeable armchair critic, and an ardent England supporter of both rugby and cricket. It is perhaps just as well that he did not witness England's sad exit from the Rugby World Cup.


But it was Peter's work with our junior cricketers that I remember so well, always around to give encouragement and support, advice on technique and proper behaviour. We shared a dream that one day a Chilmark Junior would represent his country, and Peter was determined that not only good technique be on display, but also great sportsmanship.

Peter was a keen and knowledgeable student of the works of Rudyard Kipling, and that well-loved poem "If" was like a set of rules to him. He was kindhearted, generous and a very loyal friend. We had great laughs together and he has left us with many happy memories. What more could you ask of any man?

Peter is survived by his loving wife, Anne, his children Alec and Lara, and six wonderful grand daughters, Callie, Natalie, Katie, Natasha, Tamsin and Malaika.

Mary James

I would like to add to Stephanie's and Felicity's tributes to Mary in the October issue of The Village Voice.

In 1995 the government instructed Local Authorities to organise memorials and festivities celebrating the fiftieth anniversaries of the victories over Nazi Germany (VE Day) and Japan (VE Day). The Government event granted Authorities a modest amount of money to defray the costs! There were two ways of setting about organising the festivities, either a sub-committee of Parish Councillors or asking a good organiser to take on the role.

As Chairman of the Parish Council I sounded out Mary who, as already reported, did such a good job raising funds for the church roof repairs. Mary agreed and the Parish Council welcomed it. Mary set up a committee to organise the events which included a church service on a sunny morning on the lawn of the Old Rectory (by kind permission of the Hares), a Chilmark Amateur Dramatic Society review, a street party on the Bank Holiday Monday and an exhibition of Second World War memorabilia at the Black Dog. The week ended with another service in the church. VJ Day in August was also commemorated in a more minor way. As would be expected under Mary's direction it all

Developers at Large

A number of homeowners in Chilmark have in the past month received unsolicited 'mail shot' approaches from a Romsey-based firm of property developers. In the standardised letter, **Clanfield Properties** suggests that the recipient's home sits on a plot 'some of which could be suitable for redevelopment.'

It then proceeds to explain that its approach follows a 'conversation with an Estate Agent regarding a property located a short distance from your home. Whilst researching the potential opportunity with this property I couldn't help but notice yours,' the letter continues.

When contacted for clarification, Clanfield Properties named the estate agent as one that is part of a nationwide group but with offices in Salisbury. However, the estate agent in question – which makes the point it has no history of marketing properties in Chilmark – has now denied having had any contact or discussions with Clanfield.

The recipients of the Clanfield letter – whom include homeowners in several different locations in the village including those within Chilmark's Conservation Area – have concluded that this letter is simply a fishing expedition by a property developer looking to take advantage of the Governmental push for more housing.

A key line in the letter reads as follows: 'We specifically look for small sites in affluent areas that will support good quality homes.' No mention of affordable housing. Watch this space!




St Margaret of Antioch, stained glass repair More than six months ago, vandalism at the church meant the very fine stained glass window of St John had to be removed for repair. It has now been refitted after restoration in the Salisbury Cathedral Stained Glass workshop. All the old lead has been replaced and new glass has been carefully crafted and painted to match the old and inserted in the gaps without any large broken pieces being taken out. Inevitably, breaks are still visible, but it is well worth taking a look from inside the church to see the result of months of very skilful craftsmanship. Those responsible for the work -Tom Clarke, head glazier at Salisbury, and Elizabeth Sinkova, also qualified as a glazier in conserving and painting stained glass - spent most of a rainy morning at our church putting the window back in. The cost was £2452, all of which, but for an excess of £250, is expected to be paid for under insurance. The excess has been covered by a donation made by a lady of Chilmark, whose thoughtfulness and generosity deserve the gratitude of the whole village.

Hindon Surgery Help us to help you - Updating your details

In May 2014 we published an article highlighting our problems with out of date patient details. Not much appears to have changed since then and we still have about 10% of contact details which are incorrect. Unfortunately we tend to discover incorrect details when we are trying to call a patient with a result or to follow up a problem and this can be very frustrating.

We would like to ask all patients (this applies to everyone as other surgeries will have similar problems) to check the details we have are correct. Mobile numbers and emails seem to get out of date very quickly but sometimes patients forget to tell us when they change their name or address.

We have a Change of Contact Details form in the surgery to make changing details easy, and this also includes a section for details of your important contacts. This is important because if a patient is unexpectedly very unwell, we may need to contact family members quickly.

Having correct information helps us provide you with the best health care. We also hope to start using email and text messaging to provide groups of patients with important information (dates of 'flu clinics for instance) or individual messages (like a request to make an appointment for a check-up). Our computer system can do this but we cannot start until we are confident the contact details are much more accurate.

So next time you are in the surgery, please take time to ensure that the details we have for you are up to date.

Fraudster alert

Wiltshire's Neighbourhood Alert team is urging householders to be on guard against fraudsters who have been phoning victims telling them they've been placed in the wrong council tax bracket for some years and are entitled to a rebate. They normally say this rebate should be worth about £7,000. Once the victim is convinced, the fraudster tells them that in order to receive the rebate they will need to pay an administration fee in advance. The payment they ask for varies between £60–£350. The victim provides the details and makes the payment, but then is no longer able to make contact with the person they spoke to on the phone. When they phone their council about the rebate and the fact that they are in the wrong tax bracket, the council will confirm that they know nothing about it and that they have been contacted by fraudsters.

Nadder Community Energy - your chance to invest locally!

Tom Burnett says NCE is delighted to be working with the Fonthill Estate and the businesses at Berwick Hill Dairy. The site has a total capacity of 200kw, or more than 750 solar PV panels, that will deliver clean, cheap electricity to all the businesses.

'Members will be offered interest at 5%, their capital back and there is significant income tax relief for eligible tax payers. NCE is a community benefit society. All profits, after members' interest, will be gifted to a community fund for local projects,' said Mr Burnett.
